Salvation Army Committee:

Dear Sir:—

With winter approaching it is imperative that money be raised for running expenses of the Salvation Army also that a sum of money be added to that collected last year suf-ficient to erect a building for the use of the Salvation Army.

In order to accomplish this we must cover the entire city in our solicita-tion, and we need a large number of men to do this work, so that it may

be done thoroughly—and at once.

A committee to arrange this will meet Monday noon at the Ardmore Hotel. You are one of this committee and we want you to bring with you the men whose names are given below.

All game laws are suspended. This is the open season—go get them— bring them in—alive if possible. We must have them on hand Monday noon.

The lunch will be served free to you and your "victims." Accept no excuses -men just as busy as they are will be there—why not your men?
