However, the roughs will be cleared out enoung to enable the unlucky ones to find a few balls. Some new greens are bev ing laid out that will be ready by early spring, but as a ,whole the course will not be materially changed. Creeping bent will be employed on the new greens.

Ray Bond of Joplin, chairman of the Schifferdecker greens committee was a recent visitor to the Neosho course, playing a round with Atty. Leo H. Johnson. Bond expressed the belief that the course will be a most popular one after it is completed.— Joplin Globe.
