Maxwell died Monday morning at his home after a long illness. He was a one-time Ardmore banker, who built 75 courses across the country and helped to rebuild perhaps 50 others, suffered a fractured vertebra several months ago. Several years ago he had to undergo amputation of his right leg after a burn failed to heal.

Maxwell took up his career as a links architect after retiring from the banking business in Ardmore in 1910. He had constructed the Dornick Hills course here in

He also reconstructed the Augusta course, Augusta, Ga., a project which boosted his reputation as a builder.

One of the original Rotary club members, he was a life-long Presbyterian, 32nd degree Mason and a printer.
