

Park Golf Course Rebuilding Planned

Plans to rebuild the golf course at Lincoln Homestead State Park, near Springfield, were announced today by Conservation Commissioner Henry Ward.

Through rearrangement of the tees and fairways, the nine-hole course can be lengthened from 2,075 to 2,400 yards, and par increased from 31 to 35, Ward said.

New tees will be built for all holes, and fairways will be cleared of obstructing trees. Crossing of rail fences on the old course will be eliminated by moving tees, he added.

"The work which has been

started will make the course at Lincoln Homestead one of the most interesting in the state," Ward said. "Although comparatively short as far as yardage is concerned, it will be tricky and will test the skill of the golfer. Suggestions made by Perry Maxwell, one of the country's leading golf course architects, in the building of a golf course at Kentucky Dam Village were applied in the redesigning of the Lincoln Homestead course."

The park is located five miles north of Springfield, off U. S. Highway 150 and between State Routes 53 and 55. In addition to the golf course, it contains a club house, picnic area, a rep-

lica of the cabin built by Abra-

ham. Lincoln's grandfather when he came to Kentucky, and the log house in which Lincoln's mother spent her girlhood.

"This park is one of the most interesting of the smaller shrines in the state system, and well worth a visit by both those interested in history and those looking for outdoor recreation," Ward said.
