

PERRY D. MAXWELL, BUILT GOLF COURSES

TULSA, Okla., Nov. 17 (AP)—Perry D. Maxwell, golf course architect, died today at his home here after a long illness. His age was 73.

The former Ardmore (Okla.) banker, who built seventy-five courses in the country and helped to rebuild fifty others, suffered a fractured vertebra several months ago. Eight years ago he had to undergo amputation of his right leg after a deep burn failed to heal.

Mr. Maxwell took up his career as golf links architect after retiring from the banking business in 1919. He had constructed the Dornick Hills course there in 1905.

Among his works were the Mellrose and Pine Valley Country Clubs in Philadelphia. He also reconstructed the Augusta (Ga.) Masters Course, a project that boosted his reputation as a builder.

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
