The Unitersity of Michigan course in Ann Arbor is another of his fine designs, while Southern Hills in Tules is recognized as the leading course in the Southwest.

Maxwell also revamped such famous courses as Pine Valley, Okiahoma Country club, The Willis Country club, some of the P.G.A. tournament last year, and the Philadelphia Country club.

Maxwell expressed a keen interest to the local course, and said with certain improvements, it could be made one of the best in the Southwest district.
