

The total yardage from tee to green No. 3 is 325 yards. There is a 215-yard direct course down the fairway and then a 60-yard dog leg to the green. A large dogwood tree is located on either side. One of the interesting features of the entire course is that all flags are plainly visible from the tees. There is a ravine between the tee and green on No. 3 and a walled-in spring is located on the right side of the fairway.

No. 4 is the longest on the course. It is 545 yards from the tee to the green. It has a 75-yard fairway and a natural depression for a hazard at 235 yards. There is a sinkhole on the west side of the green which will form a second hazard for overshooting the green.

It is 342 yards from tee to green No. 5, which green is a natural punchbowl. It is estimated that it would cost approximately \$1,000 to build a green like the one nature has formed at Hickory Hills. The green is 150 feet in circumference. A large sinkhole forms the hazard on this hole.

Starting on tee 6, the golfer has a fairway 110 yards wide which slopes to the east for 210 yards to a ravine. From there it is 120 yards to the green, which is located on a hill. After 212 yards have been covered on this hole the remainder of the course is made in a semi-circle. The contour of the ground proves to be a big advantage on this hole. The green at hole 6 is sloping, and it is surrounded by approximately 150 trees.

Hole No. 7 will prove difficult as the start is made off of a hill and the drive has to be made between two oak trees. The balls travel down the hill to a ravine and then to a ditch, which forms the hazard. The hazard appears at 275 yards. There is a ground rule, however, that any golfer landing a ball in the ditch can lay out without penalty. It is 310 yards from the top to the green and the green is located on the knoll of a hill. There is a group of trees on either side of the fairway. The fairway is 65 yards wide until the player reaches a point 150 yards from the green and then the fairway is 90 yards wide. No. 7 hole is the most difficult of the entire course.

The tee for hole 8 is on a knoll and the golfer will have to negotiate a double link which is formed by two springs. The yardage on this green is 335 yards. There is an 85-yard fairway which is skirted by trees. They are ash, elm, buckeye, hickory, oak and walnut.

The shortest green on the course is No. 9, which is 120 yards long. The drive for the tee is made up a slope through a grove of Walnut trees. The fairway skirts the brink
