

BEGIN WORK ON COUNTRY CLUB

PLANS HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED
FOR CLUB HOUSE AND WORK
WILL BEGIN IN 30 DAYS.

The plans for the Dornick Hill country club house have been drawn and accepted by the board of directors and work on the building will begin within the next thirty days. The building is to cost approximately \$10,000 and will be a comfortable place for the members to spend an afternoon. Perry Maxwell recently purchased the county farm at auction and it adjoins the country club has added sixty acres to the club grounds and a full 18 hole golf course will be laid out.

Too much praise cannot be given Perry Maxwell for his untiring effort in establishing a country club in this city, when the idea was first broached many of the members were skeptical and did not believe it could be done but Mr. Maxwell went to work and the first that any one in the city knew outside of himself was when he invited several out to try their hands at the game on ground that had been roughly prepared by him. Once the bug got to work there was no stopping them and now with 125 members the Dornick Hill club is going to be the best thing of the kind in the state. Golfers from other cities who have access to great country clubs state that without doubt the grounds here are the best that could be desired, in fact it is as near a perfect course as will be found anywhere and already some of the state experts, including the governor have tried it out. By the first of September the club house will be finished and when the house warming takes place the citizens of the city will be shown what a few devotees of the ancient game of golf can do when they want to play.
