

FOURTH OF JULY PROBABLE DATE OF BIG OPENING

**Cruickshank Says Links Will
Be By Far Southwest's
Best Very Soon.**

BOBBY IS GIVING LESSONS

**Bill Higgins, Assistant Pro,
On Job, Too, New Water
System To Be Had.**

Fourth of July!

That's the day the Twin Hills Golf club plans to officially open its course for the public's inspection.

All the city's golfers will be invited to test the mettle of the new links Independence day, and there probably will be a feature foursome between pros and two of the best amateurs of Oklahoma City.

Just now completion work on the 160 acres being converted into what will probably prove the southwest's leading course, is progressing at an amazing speed.

To see the course today and not again until a week later, one is struck with the nature-gifted golfing characters that crop out in that length of time.

Bobby Cruickshank, the club's professional, is on the grounds daily. His class of instruction is growing to almost a dawn-to-dusk period.

Higgins on Job

The temporary clubhouse and workshop has been outfitted and Bill Higgins, the assistant Cruickshank brought with him from Westfield, N. J., is in charge.

Cruickshank is literally "sold" on the possibilities of the Twin Hills site.

"I've seen all the leading courses across the water and most of the better ones on this side, and feel capable of judging a course's prospects while yet in the formative state," Bobby said.

"Six months from now the Twin Hills will be heralded as the best course in the southwest. The natural lay of the land makes it a wonderful course. Practically all that needs to be done is conditioning of the fairways and greens. Nature gifted the course with the best of natural hazards," Wee Bobby explained.

Plan Staging Big Tourneys

"With our course matured we'll be able to bring the Trans-Mississippi and Western Open tournaments here. And if the National Open ever comes this way our course will be worthy of entertaining it," Cruickshank opined.

Seeding of the fairways and greens has been completed and the grass already is sprouting.

In a few weeks Cruickshank and his associates will play over the eighteen holes to determine the par scores and make any distance or location changes necessary.

A watering system probably will be installed by which the course can be kept as soft during the sere summer months as it is in the spring and fall. Digging of wells on the course is being considered and the water would be piped in the rough along all the fairways to be used in a sprinkler system.
