

Women Golfers Are To Come to Ardmore

Hospitality of Walter Critchlow and His Fellow Ardmoreites Wins 1930 Oklahoma Women's Golf Tournament for Dornick Hills Country Club.

INDIAN HILLS COUNTRY CLUB, Tulsa, June 4.—(P)—Hearing what splendid hosts Walter Critchlow and his fellow Ardmoreites were during the 1929 men's tournament, the Oklahoma Women's State Golf association at its annual meeting here last night, decided to hold the 1930 meet at Dornick Hills.

The ladies had heard so many good things about the beauty of Perry Maxwell's first golf course and how royally folks down Ardmore way entertain their golfing guests that not a single argument ensued when the Dornick Hills invitation was read at the banquet.

Incidentally, Indian Hills was built by the Ardmore architect. It has many of Dornick Hills' features but is not quite as sporty as that layout down at Ardmore, where the men had so much fun with the treacherous Cliff hole.

The women at their annual banquet last night accepted the Morris Plan trophy and adopted it as the official championship cup. The elaborate cup is on display here in the Indian Hills clubhouse.

Defending the championship she has held three years, Mrs. R. E. Drennan of Tulsa was three up today on Miss Ruth Seekatz, also of Tulsa, at the end of the first nine holes of the 18-hole first round match, in the women's state golf tournament here.

Ruth Replogle, 17-year-old Oklahoma City girl, whose golfing prowess won her one of the famous Rockefeller dimes, was not doing so well in her first round with Mrs. Carl Huffman, also of the capitol city. She was three down to Mrs. Huffman at the turn, and had a card in the neighborhood of 60. Mrs. Huffman's game was little better.

Mrs. A. A. Kennedy of Tulsa was leading Mrs. G. T. Gilbertson of Muskogee by the popular three up score at the half-way mark.

Mrs. Drennan's medal card for the first nine was 46, and Miss Seekatz took 51.

All of the championship matches are over 18 holes.
