

## Country Club Votes to Make Improvements

A special meeting of the stockholders of the Norman Country Club was held at the city hall Friday night with the president, L. A. Turley, presiding.

At this meeting it was agreed that the dues should be two dollars per year, payable quarterly in advance. By a vote of the stock holders, the directors were authorized to make whatever loan necessary to raise money to build the club house and make the necessary improvements. A building committee of five is to be appointed to draw up the plans.

President Turley outlined the work of the club for the season, and spoke of the needed improvements to be made at an early date. The dam is to be repaired, trees and shrubbery are to be set out, the caretaker's house is to be moved to a more desirable site and fixed up in a more convenient and attractive manner and the premises in general are to be touched up and given a pleasing effect. As soon as the weather will permit work will be resumed on the golf course. It is also planned to lay off tennis courts, erect bath houses and make it one of the most attractive clubs in Oklahoma or the southwest.

The organization now has a reinforc-

ed concrete clay pigeon trap house fully equipped, which is regarded as one of the best traps in the state. All the property and improvements are free from indebtedness, with no outstanding bills and with about four thousand dollars in the treasury. Thursday of each week is the official shooting day, at which time about thirty to forty members participate.

The club has ninety-two active members all of whom are vitally interested and concerned in the success of the organization, and look forward to this becoming a sporting home in which each member will take personal pride and special interest. It is now planned to push the sale of the remaining thirty-three shares of stock which total sum will be \$6,000.

The officers of the club are:
