

TULSA GOLFERS SOON TO HAVE MUNY COURSE

Mohawk Park Has Ideal Ground; 600 Signers Are Needed.

TULSA, Feb. 27.—(Special)—A municipal golf course for Tulsa ready for use before this season is over, looms as a decided probability as the result of a meeting of the committee in charge of planning an eighteen-hole course in Mohawk park.

The encouragement received makes it practically certain that the movement will succeed, the committee members believe.

It will require 600 members at \$15 each to finance the course and it is believed this number can be secured within ten days after the campaign starts. Non-members of the club will be charged a ground fee of 50 cents in order to help pay for upkeep.

The plan is similar to that in use in numerous other cities and has proven a success. Speakers were appointed to appear before the directors of the various civic clubs and arrange for a committee organization.

The committee when organized will meet to formulate the general campaign. Every sporting goods store in Tulsa will be designated to receive the memberships.

The committee went over the proposed course with Perry Maxwell, well known golf course architect, who has laid out many of the best courses in the south, including the Kennedy course in Tulsa. Maxwell attended the committee meeting as the guest of Robert E. Adams.

Maxwell, who appeared before the city commission at its meeting last week, explained that golf, formerly looked on as a rich man's game, is now the sport of all classes of people.

More than 600 golf courses were built in the United States last year. The majority of them were for the use of the public which is excluded from country club courses.
