MRS. MAXWELL

Services Held in First Presby- terian Church and Body Taken to Kentucky.

Mrs. Carrie Maxwell, one of Ardmore's most beloved women, died Wednesday afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Arthur C. Straehley, 911 Stanley boulevard.

Services were held Thursday morning in the First Presbyterian church wherein Mrs. Maxwell had served as an active worker for many years and her body was taken later in the day to her early home in Princeton, Ky.

Accompanying the body to Kentucky were Mr. and Mrs. Straehley and Perry Maxwell of this city. Burial will be made beside the body of Mrs. Maxwell's husband who has been dead for several years.

Dr. Charles C. Weith paid beautiful tribute to Mrs. Maxwell at the service here, calling attention to her long active Christian life. She had taught 50 years in the Sunday schools of Kentucky and Oklahoma and was active in the First Presbyterian church of this city until her health broke a few years ago.
